The February 27th CTE millage proposal will...

- expand and enhance CTE programming to help meet the increasing demand for skilled workers in Crawford, Oscoda, Ogemaw, and Roscommon Counties.
- help more students graduate with the training and skills they need to qualify for jobs and careers that are in high demand.
- provide employers and area residents with more of the skilled workers they need.

The one-mill proposal will...

- eliminate tuition costs for C.O.O.R. CTE programs attended by area students
- provide transportation subsidies for area students attending CTE programs operated by C.O.O.R. ISD
- provide support for updating CTE-related instructional equipment in local school districts and at C.O.O.R. ISD
- increase the number of students who graduate with certification in their field of study
- increase the number of area students eligible for free college tuition
